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## Report from JPART Editor-in-Chief

JPART continues to be the leading journal in research impact over the last five years. The 2011 citation impact factors from ISSCI show JPART ranked first among 45 public administration journals with a five-year impact factor of 3.192, which is nearly a full citation per article over the next best journal. In the more volatile two year impact figures, JPART was ranked second, only 0.1 citations from first. Because these figures are based on articles published from 2006 through 2010, credit for this success should go to Craig Thomas, Carolyn Heinrich, and H. George Frederickson who edited the journal during this period.

JPART has engaged in two internationalization initiatives that will enhance its prominence: the translation of abstracts from the April 2011 issue into Chinese and the translation of abstracts from the January 2012 issue into Spanish. The first set of abstracts (which can be found on the JPART website at Oxford Journals) was accompanied by an e-mail campaign and free access to JPART for a limited amount of time for Chinese scholars. A similar process was followed for Latin American scholars. Both efforts appear to have been very success-

ful. Downloads of JPART articles increased by a factor of five during the trial period. Usage figures such as these are important for generating institutional subscriptions and justifying institutional subscription rates.

A set of JPART special issues are in progress. Under the new procedures for special issues, all submissions are individually reviewed by the same process as articles that are regularly submitted. Rather than being released as a special issue for a symposium, they will be incorporated into the regular issues with a special designation as part of a symposium. At the present time, there are four symposia at various stages. A mini-symposium on methods in public administration edited by Andrew Whitford and myself is scheduled to be part of the January 2013 issue. A symposium on public administration and local government is in process under the editorship of Rosemary O'Leary and H. George Frederickson. A mini-symposium on experimental research in public management is in process; that symposium will likely be accompanied by a JPART virtual issue on experimental work in JPART. Finally, I am in the planning stage with several individu-

The committee reviewed

four regular journal issues and three supplemental issues, for a total of 56 articles, in deciding on the award. This was an exceptional level of service by the committee and a corresponding extraordinary achievement by the award winners. We thank all for their important contributions to the Journal of Public Administration Research and Theory.

## Changes in PMRA Dues Structure

At the 2011 Public Management Research Conference in Syracuse, the executive board voted to implement a two-year membership plan. The Editor-in-Chief, Ken Meier, was able to negotiate a very positive deal. For 2012, PMRA's one-year subscription/membership price was \$104. The new rate will be a two-year membership fee of \$200. These changes will result in a four percent cut in

subscription prices and a net savings of \$23.86 based on the projected increase in institutional rates. Individuals who purchase an online-only subscription will receive a further discount of \$10, which is about half the mailing costs. Similar discounts will be applied to subscription rates for students. The new dues structure will take effect with the renewals for 2013-14.
